FROM THE CHAIRMAN . . .

Since our last edition of Citylink we have received our bi-annual visit from our friends in Chartres totalling, once again, over 40 in number. This was again very successful as you will see from the various reports in this edition.

As is the custom, a Joint Committee Meeting was held in the Council Chamber and during this meeting a 'Mini-Exchange' visit to Chartres was suggested by the Chartres' Chairman, Philippe Rabartin, for this September's Fête de la Lumières. After a couple of starts and stops, this proposed event is once again moving forward.

More than twenty people attended the meeting, speaking in both English and French - on occasions at the same time. So there was inevitably the possibility of an element of '*lost in translation*' regarding some of the finer details. 'C'est la vie'

The one and a half years 'reign' of our past Mayor and President came to an end in May and I would like to take this opportunity to thank John and Cherry Hughes for their support of our Association over this time - and to their future support as 'paid up' family members.

As a result of the May 7th Elections we now have a new Mayor and President, Councillor Peter Budge. Peter has got to know us quite well in his first month in office by attending

(together with his Mayoress, Councillor Pippa Budge) our Schools Art Competition's Private View and presenting the Winning Trophies at the Awards Ceremony, both events were held in Pallant House Gallery. In his younger years, the Mayor was involved with coaching junior teams at the Chichester Rugby Club and we hope that he will support the on-going links between the Chichester Club and their 'Under 10' counter-parts in Chartres.

Talks with the Head of the Fine Arts Department (Steve McDade) and staff at the University of Chichester are progressing well and I look forward to the 2015/16, the 7th year of this project - starting with a launch in late October 2015. In the meantime the eight Chichester and two French schools' entries for the 2014/15 event will be transported to Chartres in September for exhibiting there. In previous years the Exhibitions have been displayed in the Foyer of the Mairie, but this has now been demolished and is in the process of being rebuilt. Therefore we await confirmation of the new venue for this year's Exhibition of the children's work which, once again, was of a very high standard.

I look forward to joining with as many of you as possible on our Mini-Exchange to Chartres in September.

'The Films of François Truffaut'

Wednesday September 16th at 7.30 pm

François Truffaut was one of the key figures in the French New Wave and remains to this day an icon of French cinema. Using cinema as an escape from a troubled family life, Truffaut was as a teenager already a serious student of the genre.



His early years are portrayed in his first major film, 'Les Quatre Cent Coups', a low budget film which marked a significant break with the Hollywood tradition. Truffaut directed twenty-five more films during his career, including 'Tirez sur le Pianiste' and 'Jules et Jim', where he worked with the wonderful Jeanne Moreau.

Ellen Cheshire is Associate Lecturer at the University of Chichester in Media and Cultural Studies. She regularly hosts talks and gives lectures at Arts venues in the South East, including the Chichester Cinema at New Park and West Dean College.

THE EXCHANGE 2015

30th April - 4th May

Travelling via Dieppe-Newhaven ferry ports, it was quite late on Thursday evening when our French guests arrived in Chichester. Regardless of the time the atmosphere was, as usual, wonderful - with lots of hugs and kisses for long-standing 'twinners' and polite introductions for 'first-timers' (of which there were several from both sides of the Channel). Then home to bed in readiness for the very full weekend programme of activities for which we congratulate Julia and her team who had organised these.

Additionally, at 10.00am on Friday morning we were invited to join the [then] Mayor, John Hughes, to wave 'bon voyage' to the cyclists taking part in Chichester Harbour Rotary Club's Annual Charity Cycle Ride to Chartres which set off from outside the Council House. It was most appropriate that Isabelle Mesnard (one of our 'new' twinners) was there, as she is the 'Adjoint' responsible for Sports in Chartres (who greeted Chichester's Under 10's Mini Rugby Team at the Civic Reception when they went to Chartres last November).

With thanks to the Mayor, the annual joint meeting of our two twinning committees ('Friends of Chartres' & 'Les Amis de Chichester') was held in the Council Chamber - with the largest ever number of attendees from these two committees! Claire Crézé brought a replacement 'Coup de Coeur Trophy' for the Schools Art Competition. This had again been produced by Atelier Picot and was much admired by all those present. She had also brought photos of Chartres, to be framed and then displayed at the forthcoming Three Cities event. The morning concluded with the Mayor's Reception held in the Assembly Room, to which all hosts and guests had been invited, and where Civic gifts were exchanged between the two Mayors - with Isabelle Mesnard standing in on behalf of the Mayor of Chartres.

After lunch the 'Programme' which was organised by Julia and her team, gave a choice of three 'optional' afternoon activities. For the more active participants, Paul Devonshire led a 'Ramblers'-type guided walk around the shoreline at the Witterings (unfortunately, no photos have been received).

The Weald & Downland Open Air Museum at Singleton was host to a further choice of 'hands-on' activities which were organised - and led - by Julia, and Jan. These comprised a variety of medieval tasks which were demonstrated, explained, and tried out by those attending and also the re-creation of food preparation in a Tudor kitchen . A fully illustrated report with photos are included on page 6 of this newsletter.

Chichester's Museum 'The Novium' in Tower Street, also provided some 'hands-on' activities to be experienced and enjoyed by those taking part in the Guided Tour, as can be seen in the photos (*left*). With John Wilton & Barry Sheers on hand to help with translation, the tour concluded with an English Cream Tea.

That evening the Vicar's Hall, in South Street, was the venue for our formal dinner to which we invited the Mayor & Mayoress. A welcoming drink set the scene for a relaxed atmosphere to enjoy the delicious three course meal. To enable our non-hosting members to meet our French guests, they were also invited to join us. Although this was our 'formal' dinner where gifts were exchanged, speeches were kept to a minimum, with just the Chairmen of each committee, ie Ray Brown & Philippe Rabartin making these. However, their Vice Chairmen (ie Julia Sander and Jean-Claude Grouteau) acted as 'interpreters' - thus creating much humour.

Saturday morning the French coach, together with our coach from Woods Travel, left Chichester at 9.00am for the trip to Salisbury where a guided tour of the Cathedral had been arranged. Our guide, Steve Williams, (*see photos side right*) was really good and with Rosie Speer acting as translator it was a most enjoyable visit. On learning of our connection with Chartres Steve ensured we saw their Loire stained glass window before going on to see the Magna Carta exhibition - part of a programme of events commemorating the 800th Anniversary of this famous document. After lunch and some more sightseeing it was back to Chichester in readiness for the evening Concert in St Peter & St Paul's Church, Northgate.

Entitled 'Entente Cordiale' and celebrating the music of France and the UK, this Concert was 'Magnificent'. Congratulations go to all who were involved. Crispin Ward, Head of Orchestra at the University, excelled in conducting 150+ performers. These included the University's Symphony Orchestra, their Chamber Choir, West Sussex Youth Choir, Portsmouth High School for Girls Choir and Chartres Grand Chœur de Maitrise - whose 44+ members had arrived late Friday evening and would be returning early Monday morning.

Sunday was 'Free Time' so Ray and I joined Isabelle's hosts, Janet & Tony Harrison (President of Chichester Lions Club), for a pub lunch. This would have also included our French guests but sadly they had to cancel due to illness. Afterwards we took Isabelle on a very brief 'Art Trail' tour then to Evensong in the Cathedral where we once again met the Chartres' Choir and their Director, Philippe Frémont, who was a former chorister of Chartres Cathedral. As the weather was good we returned to Tony's via the Trundle, to enable Isabelle to see the lovely views which Tony had tried to describe to her during their earlier cycle ride - in bad weather! We really did appreciate and enjoy sharing the last evening together.

Monday's 'Bring & Share' lunch was cancelled because the afternoon ferry was cancelled. So, like previous years, François Remey took his group photo (*front page*) and we said our farewells in Northgate car park at 7.30am. Our thanks go to everyone, and especially all the hosts, who helped to make this such an enjoyable weekend.

WORKSHOPS AT THE WEALD & DOWNLAND MUSEUM

On arrival at the museum, participants were greeted by Museum Director, Richard Pailthorpe, who gave a short presentation about the museum and its history. The workshops focused on rural life in Tudor times and gave hands-on experience of cooking and spinning.



Life for a yeoman farmer and his family was one of unremitting toil, punctuated by the occasional feast.

Participants learned that the farmer and his wife not only had to grow their own food, but also had to produce wood for fires, and flax and wool for their clothing. In the textiles workshop, the laborious process of creating linen from flax was explained. Some of the group tried their hand at spinning – surprisingly difficult – though mastered early in life by females in Tudor times.



Then there was a visit to the Winkhurst kitchen where Julia and Jan Sander, as kitchen wench and fireboy respectively, explained the diet of the sons of the land: bread, vegetables and bread again, washed down with copious draughts of ale. Meat was a rare luxury, as farm animals were far too useful on the farm to be slaughtered. On this simple diet, farm workers performed prodigious feats, burning off up to six thousand calories a day.



Everyone took part in creating the dough for Excellent Small Cakes. These contained spices – a great luxury in Tudor times – and no sugar. This would have been far too expensive. The cakes were then cooked on the griddle over a wood fire and sampled.



The verdict? Delicious, despite the lack of sugar, burnt edges and smoky flavour.

CHARTRES' CFA & CHICHESTER COLLEGE

Claire Crézé had received a request from the person in charge of Pedagogy at 'Centre de Formation des Apprentis (CFA) du Bâtiment' in Chartres (a school for vocational training in construction), who wished to organise a visit for her 18 year old students to a similar place in England. As the College runs a similar training scheme teaching carpentry, plumbing, electricity & heating we managed to organise a meeting with the Head of Department and lecturer in charge of apprenticeships during the recent Exchange.



Following a tour of the new department, which impressed us all, Claire explained that all French students must now learn English. She delivered a file with more details about the proposed project, and took contact details for Chartres' CFA to follow up a possible link with Chichester College. The Department is interested in taking this further and is already experienced in this field, having established a similar project with another French institution. So we now 'watch this space'.



CATERING & PUBLIC SERVICES

We took Claire, Philippe & Isabelle to the College's Bistro Restaurant for lunch. The hospitality student behind the counter was French,



so no 'language' problem here, until she tried to explain the course content for 'cabin crew' ie: serving food to 'passengers' on the 'College' aircraft.

We also met Tony Quinn, lecturer in Public Services Department. He confirmed that his team, and a team from Speyer, would go to Ravenna for Eurosport 2015 but again no team from Chartres. This is sad as Chartres initiated this contest in 2001, to link its twin cities. Although too late for this year, we're very hopeful our French 'trio' will find a new team to reinstate the Chartres' input

A Private View on 4th June in the Studio at Pallant House Gallery was a good social occasion for our members and teachers to see the artworks submitted for this year's Schools Art Competition. All entries were shown on the room's electronic browser and each school had at least one entry displayed within the Exhibition, which was hung by freelance artist, Mandie Saw, in collaboration with PHG's Natalie Franklin.

Specially invited guests, including the new Mayor & Mayoress, Cllrs Peter & Pippa Budge, High Sheriff, Denise Patterson, and Steve McDade, Head of the University's Fine Arts Department, admired the artworks submitted by a total of 10 schools, 8 local and 2 from Chartres. A book was available for comments which made interesting reading. Conversations seemed to indicate many differing views as to which entry would be the Winner.

Our Chairman, Ray Brown, thanked PHG's Executive Director, Marc Steene, who helped initiate this project in readiness for the 50th Anniversary of our Twinning with Chartres, and whose support had enabled us to work in partnership over this long period of time. Whilst we are sad to leave the Gallery we are

very optimistic of our future working with Steve McDade at the University. Marc has offered to continue his support, so we feel very fortunate indeed to be able to carry on giving the pupils an opportunity to develop their artistic skills and talents whilst learning about our City's French twinning.



Marc welcomed pupils, parents and teachers to the Awards Ceremony on 6th June and thanked the sponsors and councils who had provided grants, whilst Ray repeated his 'thanks' to Marc and Pallant House Gallery which he had first given at the Private View.

Apologies were received from the Mayor of Chartres and the Chartres' Twinning Association, who had provided a new 'Coup de Coeur' Trophy. The Judging Panel comprised, Lin Chaplin, Sandra Peaty, Ray Brown and Rob Campling. Lin gave the Judges' feedback, Marc and Ray presented each school with a framed certificate. I was presented with the Trophy for l'école de Rechèvres (the French Winners) with the remit that, as Honorary Secretary, I was to ensure its safe delivery to Chartres!

As Marc then announced the prize-winners, in reverse order, the Mayor & Mayoress jointly presented Jessie Younghusband with a 'Commended' certificate and a 'Highly Commended' certificate was presented to Funtington. The competition standard had been so high that the judges decided to award a 2nd place certificate and Prize-winning Workshops for the pupils AND the 'Coup de Coeur' Trophy, which were then presented to Lavant C of E Primary School. Finally, it was announced that West Dean Primary was the 'Winner' and, in addition to the Trophy and Certificate, there was a Prize-winning workshop for their pupils.

The Chairman summed up by thanking the Judging Panel, PHG Staff, and Rob Campling who took photos of this event and also the PV. Chartres' Mairie was in the process of being rebuilt, but the artwork would still go to France in September and hang in a new venue. A reception was then held in the Garden Gallery to which everyone was invited.

Eurosport 2015, held in Ravenna during June, included a team from Chichester College Public Service Department which was led by their lecturer, Tony Quinn.



Eleven members of the FoC Ciné Club met on Sunday 17th May in the plush surroundings of our Roundmill Picture Palace (at the New Park Centre). We came to see the film '*Untouchable*' described in the DVD as an "Absolute Must".

The story is based on a true event between a handicapped millionaire and his ex-con carer. It depicts an unlikely camaraderie rooted in honesty and humour between two very different individuals.

The scene opens on a huddled row of have-nots who are being interviewed for a job or benefits. Albert is chosen: he is a bald, 6-foot, lanky individual with a goofy smile. His new employer François is a paralytic confined to a wheelchair. Albert's rapturous and clownish reaction to the Rothschildian opulence of his new boss brings a wry smile to the face of the incurable invalid. The French audience find it all very rigolo.

After the ineffable adventures together, by land, sea and parachute, François admits to his carer that he would welcome some feminine company. Albert, the 'Untouchable', is in charge of this venture. Photos are exchanged and a suitable applicant is found.
